LETTER FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD

his past year, our partnership has brought powerful messages that hold gender equality – across political, social, and economic spheres – to the forefront.

Driven by movements in a variety of settings in Canada and across the world, we saw the emphasis on gender equality culminate in major global moments like Women Deliver 2019, held in June in Vancouver, Canada. Embedded in the push for gender equality are efforts to break down persistent barriers faced by women and gender diverse peoples in order to realize stronger health outcomes.

The objectives of the Sustainable Development Goals and Canada's Feminist International Assistance Policy were backed up by concrete actions that recognize health and gender equality as inherently linked. Many of these actions have been driven and inspired by civil society,

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academic institutions, researchers, and grassroots organizers who work to build healthier, more gender equal communities. Bringing together these key players in an intentional manner has long been CanWaCH's mission.

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This was a year of noteworthy growth; of our collective efforts to inform policy that considers health and gender equality as principal objectives of Canadian international assistance; of the arsenal of tools and resources upon which we rely to measure and show the impact of our collective work; and of our endeavours to reach across silos to make progress together for women, children, and gender diverse peoples globally.

With our Canadian and international partners, we must continue our considerable forward progress in our programming and collaborations – from effectively communicating our messages and engaging stakeholders, to collecting and utilizing data to inform our programming, to continuously building our knowledge of best practices in global health and gender transformative programming. We have come together in unprecedented ways to break down barriers and to work collaboratively for global health and gender equality.

As we see the pervasive effects of climate change, political conflict, and other sources of global turmoil disproportionately affect the health and livelihoods of women, children, and gender diverse peoples, the connections and collaboration we have cultivated are more important than ever. In the face of these challenges, we must not let our growth and leadership falter.

CanWaCH was there, alongside our Members and together with the 340 organizations that formed Women Deliver Mobilization Canada, as we rallied for gender equality and the health, rights, and well-being of women and girls in the lead up to Women Deliver 2019. This was a pivotal moment for Canadian leadership in creating a more just and equitable world.

As we push forward together to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals, we're cultivating a movement in Canada that recognizes the linkages between international and domestic challenges. From Lagos to Yellow-knife to Dhaka, we must continue to work in solidarity and hold fast to our vision of a world where thriving women and children everywhere are the status quo.



2018-2019 was marked by significant expansion in the exchange of knowledge among Members on key topics related to global health and gender equality. The CanWaCH 2018 AGM (November 20, 2018) was a major moment for learning and sharing. The AGM was hosted within the 2018 Canadian Conference on Global Health (CCGH), during which CanWaCH also facilitated three interactive sessions for Members related


to gender equality and health in fragile contexts, data challenges, and public engagement. These sessions set the stage for an increased flow of knowledge among CanWaCH Members and Associates over the course of the year.

In March 2019, we launched the Learning Series, a comprehensive and purpose-driven sequence of learning opportunities for Members and Associates to foster the exchange of best practices, expertise and practical capacity-strengthening opportunities. Since the launch, the Learning Series has featured several webinars for Members, including a two-part video series on partnership-building in health in fragile settings and an informative webinar on understanding the Thrive Agenda.



GENDER **EQUALITY**

Our priority to increase collaboration and learning related to gender equality was also amplified this year as we strove to open space to share practical tools, resources, and insights related to implementing gender transformative programming in global health. The Gender Equality Working Group (GEWG) has been instrumental in guiding capacity-building opportunities for Members, and, in May 2019, GEWG Members and colleagues came together to share their knowledge and identify best practices at a day-long workshop focused on gender transformative approaches to health.





worked with a strong and diverse coalition of Canada's leading global health experts. Articulated as the "Thrive Agenda", our vision was to set out a comprehensive and integrated approach to health and rights across the full continuum of care that places the woman, adolescent, child and newborn at the centre and unlocks her access to the full spectrum of interventions needed throughout her life-course to reach her full potential.

The Women Deliver 2019 Conference provided a galvanizing moment for the coalition to anchor its engagement with a broad range of stakeholders to advance the Thrive Agenda from an ambitious policy vision to a tangible political commitment. These efforts culminated in a landmark announcement by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau on June 4, 2019 in the Women Deliver Plenary Hall that the Government of Canada will scale up its funding to reach \$1.4 billion annually by 2023, to support women and girls' health around the world. An unprecedented ten-year commitment, this historic investment will advance sexual and reproductive health rights and maternal, newborn, adolescent and child health and nutrition.

GROWING CANADIANS' ENGAGEMENT ON GLOBAL HEALTH AND GENDER EQUALITY

The reach of the **#LeadOnCanada** campaign was reflected in public opinion research conducted for CanWaCH by Nanos Research and released in August 2019. The survey found that 76% of respondents strongly or somewhat agree that Canadians have a duty to support the health, education and economic opportunity for the world's poorest and most marginalized people (up 55% from four years ago). The percentage of Canadians reporting their awareness of Canada's leadership in global women's, maternal and child health has doubled since 2015 to 43% in 2019. Over half of Canadians expressed having much or somewhat more pride in being Canadian as a result of knowing about Canadian leadership.

Since then, six collaborative projects, or "Labs", comprised of partnerships between academic, civil society and global partners have been on an innovation journey to tackle urgent data challenges in global health and gender equality. 
We continue to prioritize enhancing the capacity to measure and evaluate the effectiveness of Canada's investment in women and children's health and remain guided by the needs and recommendations of the sector. We have scaled up our efforts to collect and aggregate data to tell compelling stories about our Members' and stakeholders' work. For example, the number of projects in the CanWaCH Project Explorer has more than doubled over the course of the last year, with almost 600 projects currently included. We also launched the **Analytics Portal**, which allows users to interact with and utilize data shared by organizations working in the sector in a variety of creative ways. As a complement to the ProX and the Analytics Portal, we released the inaugural interactive Global Health Impact Report. This digital report captures the breadth and depth of Canadian contributions to global health

and gender equality data, research, and evaluation in an accessible and engaging fashion. The report features the work of over 60 Canadian organizations, and contains compelling case studies, interviews, and digital dashboards.

Over the past year, we also worked to amplify the work of Country Working Groups for Haiti and Mozambique. The Haiti Country Working Group is a growing network of Canadian organizations with operations in Haiti. Today, this network includes 50+ staff based in Canada and Haiti, representing over 30 organizations. The Mozambique Country Working Group, established in 2019, is in its early stages. Can-WaCH has set up a network of focal points from Canadian and global organizations working in Mozambique, and is currently working on an inventory of projects and planning an in-person meeting for late 2019.
